This week's reading includes the famous parable of the 'wedding banquet'... it's a little strange reading it at this time, when weddings are restricted to very small family gatherings, but if we have in mind a huge social event for a regional ruler - like a royal garden party... then we can imagine what Jesus is illustrating. The Kingdom of heaven - firstly, we hear the great news that it's not dull and quiet but it is a great joyful celebration that has been being planned prepared for a long time...a wedding banquet for the King's heir no less! But there is a problem -of those who were first on the list to come, some of them receive the invitation but are buried in their own mundane concerns - one a farm, another a business... so that they ignore the great event! Others who are invited, have a bad attitude toward the king, hostile even - and reject the invitation with violence. But the party is going ahead - and the invitation, which was once to a chosen few, is now opened to all - everyone is welcome to come to the Kingdom of Heaven, not just God's chosen people and their leadership... But there is a hitch.... whilst everyone is welcome high or low, those who come, must still respect the King, must come with a sense of the occasion... they need to clean up their act and get themselves actually ready to respond to the invitation... and those who come disrespectfully and unprepared, without cleaning up their act and, in the parable, putting on a wedding robe - they will find themselves kicked back out again.

So everyone is welcome to God's great party - but that doesn't mean that the invitation is less valuable, or that the occasion is less important - it just means that whether we are excluded from the event is not down to a stingy ruler, but down to our own approach to the awesome event, so don't ignore the invite, better find out what you're expected to wear! **You could do worse than look in Colossians chapter 3 for a dress code!**

FIRST READING Isaiah 25:1-9

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

O LORD, you are my God; I will exalt you, I will praise your name; for you have done wonderful things, plans formed of old, faithful and sure. For you have made the city a heap, the fortified city a ruin; the palace of aliens is a city no more, it will never be rebuilt. Therefore strong peoples will glorify you; cities of ruthless nations will fear you. For you have been a refuge to the poor, a refuge to the needy in their distress, a shelter from the rainstorm and a shade from the heat. When the blast of the ruthless was like a winter rainstorm, the noise of aliens like heat in a dry place, you subdued the heat with the shade of clouds; the song of the ruthless was stilled. On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-matured wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-matured wines strained clear. And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death for ever. Then the Lord GOD will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the LORD has spoken. It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the LORD for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

Philippians 4:1-9

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians.

My brothers and sisters, whom I love
and long for, my joy and crown, stand
firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.
I urge Euodia and I urge Syntyche to be
of the same mind in the Lord. Yes, and I
ask you also, my loyal companion, help
these women, for they have struggled
beside me in the work of the gospel,
together with Clement and the rest
of my co-workers, whose names are
in the book of life. Rejoice in the Lord
always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let
your gentleness be known to everyone.
The Lord is near. Do not worry about
anything, but in everything by prayer
and supplication with thanksgiving let
your requests be made known to God.
And the peace of God, which surpasses
all understanding, will guard your hearts
and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally,
beloved, whatever is true, whatever is
honourable, whatever is just, whatever is
pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is
commendable, if there is any excellence
and if there is anything worthy of praise,
think about these things. Keep on doing
the things that you have learned and
received and heard and seen in me, and
the God of peace will be with you.

GOSPEL Matthew 22:1-14

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Once more Jesus spoke to the chief
priests and Pharisees in parables,
saying: "The kingdom of heaven may
be compared to a king who gave a
wedding banquet for his son. He sent
his slaves to call those who had been
invited to the wedding banquet, but
they would not come. Again he sent
other slaves, saying, 'Tell those who
have been invited: Look, I have prepared
my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves
have been slaughtered, and everything
is ready; come to the wedding banquet.'
But they made light of it and went
away, one to his farm, another to his
business, while the rest seized his slaves,
maltreated them, and killed them. The
king was enraged. He sent his troops,
destroyed those murderers, and burned
their city. Then he said to his slaves, 'The
wedding is ready, but those invited were
not worthy. Go therefore into the main
streets, and invite everyone you find
to the wedding banquet.' Those slaves
went out into the streets and gathered
all whom they found, both good and
bad; so the wedding hall was filled with
guests. But when the king came in to
see the guests, he noticed a man there
who was not wearing a wedding robe,
and he said to him, 'Friend, how did you
get in here without a wedding robe?'
And he was speechless. Then the king
said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand
and foot, and throw him into the outer
darkness, where there will be weeping
and gnashing of teeth.' For many are
called, but few are chosen."
